An International Impact

As we created Urban Ecology Center branches, we were barely thinking outside of the bounds of our neighborhoods. Our goals were all about "acting local" - protecting and enhancing Milwaukee's natural areas and its surrounding waters. "Thinking global" was attainable, but "acting global" seemed a bit out of reach. The thought of our work having anything to do with places as far flung as Guatemala, Mexico, Israel, the Congo or Tanzania was not even possible to



conceive of back in those earlier days. It was also hard to imagine that we would be able to connect with someone internationally known on the environmental scene. But now all of these places, and a surprising number of well-known people, are touched in some way by our work.

Our stewardship of the land here in Milwaukee is impacting places many thousands of miles away! Did you know that an indigo bunting that we have recaptured in our banding nets four times over the past years ... one that uses Riverside Park as its summer nesting grounds, likely spends every winter in Guatemala? Three monarchs we tagged (yes indeed, we put a tiny sticker on their back wings) made it all the way to Michoacán, Mexico where they overwinter in massive colonies.

But it is not just animals we are impacting across borders. If you were to visit La Paz, Mexico you would find El Mangle, an ecology center designed to be similar to our buildings and community engagement model.

Last summer an Israeli delegation visited on an excursion to five different U.S. cities to see if there was a project that inspired them. Their intention was to recreate that project in northern Israel.

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Community Science

I've thought it a little strange that one of the most important identifiers we carry – our names – are usually given to us by someone else. Of course we can always choose to go by nicknames, middle names or change names completely.

Thirteen years ago I accepted a position to lead the fairly young Citizen Science Department at the Urban Ecology Center. The Center was one of the first places in the world to have a Citizen Science department because it was a brand new field. Or was it? The reality is that we just gave a new name to a process that had been occurring for millennia – science undertaken wholly or in part by non-professional scientists (think Charles Darwin, Benjamin Franklin, Increase Lapham or any community member studying the world).

A few years after this field was named, we began to hear objections to the term Citizen in Citizen Science, particularly from communities with significant immigrant populations near the southern borders of the United States. Although the term citizen in this context was put forth with an entirely different meaning—as a civilian differentiated from academics or even as a citizen of the Earth—this was a new perspective I wanted to understand.

About 10 years ago we polled our "citizenry", those involved with Citizen Science at the Center, and other community members not involved with the department. Feedback indicated that it didn't seem like an important or polarizing issue so we kept the name but continued the discourse.

Over the next decade the conversation continued and opposition to the term grew. I started to feel like I was defending the use of the name even as I recognized this growing discontent. The term felt even more unwelcoming as "illegal immigration" began to dominate headlines and the fear of deportation consumed more people's lives.

Soil Sleuthing

It was one of those freakishly warm days in February when the temperatures rose into the low 70s. I was working with a group of excited, but respectful, 2nd graders from Franklin Pierce Elementary. We were focusing on one of the most important of nature's resources, soil. Inside we learned how the FBI (fungus, bacteria, and invertebrates) change sticks, leaves and other organic material into soil. Then we headed outside for some exploring.

We made our way in the warm sun to a multitude of dirt piles we use for adding soil to our park. Each student was given a spade as their scientific instrument. Soon the students were digging in the dirt more enthusiastically than a dog digging for a bone, looking for those FBI.

It did not matter that they were not finding anything right away. Just having this tool in their hands was enough for them. Soon though we made our first find, ancient rocks (gravel) that we decided could be a meteorite! There's nothing like a little imagination to spark the curiosity of young scientists. Suddenly one of the students yelled, "I got a worm! I got a worm!" With mud-coated hands the student proudly showed his find.

All the students flocked to the spot quicker than crows mobbing an owl. They all couldn't wait

to dig in that exact same spot. I explained that there are many worms out there and if we all dug in the same spot someone was going to end up with a face full of dirt. We continued our digging in different spots. Worm after worm, meteorite after meteorite, we kept exploring. Their excitement could not be contained.

The students dug and dug all morning long until we had to give up our spot to the other half of the class that was exploring the park. We could have spent all of our time there, no doubt.

As I listened to the stories of discoveries made, reflected on how all of this excitement came from just from digging in the soil.

Just giving students the chance to dig and use a tool was enough for them to puzzle out what can be discovered in nature.

How simple, how engaging, and how amazing nature is when you just get out there and play, as well as get a bit dirty!

The teacher could not have been more pleased with his students and all the things they discovered that day. I also learned something; it is not the fancy vocabulary students learn while here or the concepts we think children should know that builds a land ethic. It is the chance to explore without worry and to get their hands a bit dirty while connecting with our planet. #

Community Science

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We polled our constituents again recently and received an overwhelming response in favor of coming up with a more welcoming name that didn't alienate a segment of the community.

So I am happy to announce that the Citizen Science Department of the Urban Ecology Center is now going to be the Community Science Department. We want to emphasize that everyone in the community is encouraged to collaborate with us to perform research and monitoring, whether it's learning how to survey for wildlife, managing and analyzing data or carrying out original research. We are

also not the first to make this change but are joining other groups, such as Public Lab.

Public Lab, an organization founded by former UEC intern Shannon Dosemagen, focuses on creating deep collaborative networks guided by the questions and goals of all people involved in a project. They define community science as collaboratively-led scientific investigation, exploration and engagement in the entirety of the scientific process.

Old habits die hard and you will likely still hear us using the term Citizen Science. But over the coming year you will see us roll out the change—from our website and annual reports to the sign over the door to Citizen Science Lab at Riverside Park. Whether you've put in hundreds of hours over the years or you're hearing about our department for the first time, I encourage you to come on a snake survey, work with Young Scientists or participate in the inaugural Brew City Birding Festival. Our collaborative work keeps getting better and better because of the talents and passion of our amazing community of Land Stewards, Volunteers, Community Programs, Visitors Service, schools, summer camps and our advisory groups.

An International Impact

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Guess what they ended up picking as their project? As I write, Urban Ecology Center Board Member Eric Crawford, his wife Elsie, Beth Heller and I are preparing for a trip to Tiberias, a small city on the Sea of Galilee. We are going to help local residents explore how to create their own Urban Ecology Center.

Our most recent global connection happened during the publishing process of our new book, *Urban Ecology: A Natural way to Transform Kids, Parks, Cities and the World.* Our publisher asked if in addition to getting quotes of support from local leaders, we would be able to get an endorsement from someone nationally or even internationally known? With our ever expanding network it was possible. We are connected to people who are internationally known in environmental circles. But the question was, did we know anyone who would be recognized by our publisher and people in general? You know, someone like Jane Goodall?

Hey, wait, could we connect to Jane Goodall? Wouldn't that be amazing?

At first, I laughed at the idea. We had no connection to her as far as I knew. That's when we had an inspired idea. Our Forester, Caitlin Reinartz, is the daughter of Gay

Reinartz, Director of the Bonobo and Congo Biodiversity Initiative of the Milwaukee County Zoo -- essentially the Jane Goodall of Bonobos right here in Milwaukee!

"Caitlin, do you think your Mom knows Jane Goodall?" I asked.

A few texts later and I was in conversation with Gay. She agreed to help and wrote a lovely letter to Jane. In the wee hours of the morning Jane's assistant, Mary Lewis, let us know that Jane was off line in Tanzania. Her odd hour of correspondence led me to believe that Mary herself was communicating from somewhere exotic perhaps, and sure enough, she was in the Orkney Islands off the Northern coast of Scotland.

Mary kept our letter in mind and miraculously connected us to Jane in the narrow window of time she was around wifi. Now, when the print version of our book comes out this summer you'll see the following quote:

"As one who has dedicated my life to protecting the Chimpanzee, I know from experience that it is only by instilling respect and love for nature in the next generation that we have any chance to preserve thriving ecosystems that support life on this planet. It is why places like the Urban Ecology Center are so critical for conservation education. As more and more children are growing up in cities, teaching land stewardship and nature conservation to children and their families is critical. I am excited by this book as it puts forth a practical blue print for how to do this well. The book shares the story of a model that has been perfected in three unique urban neighborhoods in Milwaukee, is being modeled in other cities in the United States and is beginning to spread to cities across the globe."
